Re: Motion: Request to fund BOE pilot projects with "cool asphalt" for paving

Motion: The committee recommends that WRAC:

- 1. Request that Council Districts allocate discretionary funding to StreetsLA to expand pilot cool asphalt paving programs in other areas.
- 2. Request that the City increase funding and expand paving with cool asphalt, pending results of pilot program during the next year.

Facts and background:

- Material is a silicone/latex-type coating that is spread on top of asphalt (a replacement for slurry). It has a lighter color, and reflects more sunlight and heat than dark asphalt. It was originally a roofing material, and seals the road, which may not allow sufficient water infiltration and may become slippery and bubble up. Painted stripes may be difficult to maintain.
- 2. Because of discoloring over time, it may be better for smaller, local roads (instead of busy arterials with more heavy vehicles).
- Truck sprayers may reduce cost of installation (instead of workers with squeegees), and a consortium of cities may get volume discounts, so cost can be compared to slurry.
- 4. City manufactures its own asphalt and maintains asphalt, but it must purchase the cool coating and rely on contractor to maintain roads.
- 5. Days of 95+ degrees will increase 2-4 times by 2040, and include many poor neighborhoods with low tree cover (Westlake, Pico-Union, Boyle Heights, Sylmar, North Hollywood, Canoga, West Adams, South L.A.).

- 6. The product is being tested for durability during on pilot projects in Los Angeles in the next 1.5 years. Phoenix installed a pilot project 6 months ago.
 - a. A demonstration project was installed with a paved road / sidewalk section on Marquerite St. and on 4400 Kraft St. in Studio City, at 3 locations in the San Fernando Valley on 10 blocks (Canoga Park, Sun Valley and Pacoima), and a 2-block stretch in South L.A. A full list of pilot program locations is needed. Pilot programs should focus on hotter and unshaded areas with fewer trees.

Findings and justifications:

1. Retention of less heat reduces the urban heat island effects and reduces costs (air conditioning, heat strokes/ healthcare, mental health) – see heat map with cooler blue areas of pilot projects.
